It's worth a visit so come and call.


The next Flower Show 9th, 10th November

THE GARDEN CLUBS OF AUSTRALIA AWARDS 2019

Congratulations to Gayle Carroll who has been awarded the Joan O'Brien Award for achieving excellence by an individual in Floral Art.

Parts of our submission for Gayle follow:

Over the last four years Gayle has taken on the role of co-ordinator of the floral art group and in that role she has been on the committee of the Launceston Horticultural Society.

Every month, over the show season (we hold four a year), she organises a workshop on Saturday afternoon on different aspects of floral art, providing written notes and photographs of examples and doing an actual demonstration of the particular style or line arrangement, before commenting on all our attempts.

Gayle's style of teaching and supportive manner has seen this group grow from strength to strength with new members joining, including school age students. She has played a significant role in Floral Art becoming a major part of our four seasonal

shows - our last show saw an amazing fifty entries in this section!

Gayle selects the topics for the schedule each show. She also enters the Open class and often receives the Joan Ward Certificate for the most outstanding floral art exhibit in the Open class.



On occasions she judges floral art at various local shows. She has also organised the floral art displays at the Blooming Tasmania Show.

Gayle leads a busy life in retirement but gives unstintingly to our ever increasing floral art group. She sets up the floral art section in our show, organises the judges, takes the entries and rosters to the stewards, as well as organising the workshops.

THE DAHL MEDAL - AWARDED IN THE FIELD OF DAHLIAS

Congratulations must go to Charles Smith who is the latest recipient of the prestigious "Dahl Medal". This is awarded to a person who has contributed greatly to the growing and promotion of Dahlias on a National basis. There can be no more than five living persons to hold this award. Charlie forwarded the following:

At the National Conference in Ballarat in June I was given the Dahl Medal for services to the promotion of dahlias. The Dahl Medal is named after the man who brought the dahlia from its native home in Mexico and put into the gardens throughout Europe. From there it has spread throughout the gardens of the world.

The Dahl Medal was introduced by the Dahlia Society of Australia to recognize persons who have made an outstanding contribution over many years to the growing of dahlias in Australia.

The criteria against which nominees for the award are judged are:

- Has contributed greatly to dahlias in Australia.
- Has promoted the dahlia.
- Contributes to the management of Societies.
- Supports Shows.
- Introduces Dahlias of quality.
- Encouragers new growers.
- A mentor to prospective members and new growers.
- Judges Publications, presentations for meetings, conferences and field days.
- Contributes to newsletters.
- Is an ambassador for dahlias.


