THE MIKE TEMPLE-SMITH MEMORIAL GARDEN

Some eighty friends and relatives of the late Dr Mike Temple-Smith attended a most enjoyable afternoon in September at the home of Wilmar Bouman and Matthew Ryan in Acton for the official opening of the Mike Temple-Smith Memorial Garden.

During the last years of Mike's illness he grew the bulk of his daffodils in the back garden of his wife, Ruth's daughter, Della. Many seedlings and miniature varieties he grew at home. With some help from my husband, Kevin, Mike dug and bagged the bulbs from Della's garden and entrusted them to Mike's friend, Wilmar

Bouman. Wilmar is a respected landscape gardener, having created the beautiful garden at Corinda on the Glebe some years ago. In his new home, formerly belonging to his parents, Wilmar planned a new enterprise – a Memorial Garden for Mike's lovely daffodils.

The bulbs were simply bedded for the first two years and meticulously catalogued by name and colour. Wilmar's aim was to create a visually stunning walk between two banks of daffodils, tulips and ultimately blue hyacinths reminiscent of the displays seen in his native Holland. The ground was prepared and irrigation laid. Wilmar has used natural timber to

great effect and planted birch trees to create an attractive cover.

On the day of the opening the daffodils were in full display complemented by golden tulips and other interesting shrubs. I have never seen bulbs planted with such precision, each having space to multiply. The blooms were large and very healthy, a tribute to Wilmar's knowledge and care. A plaque organised by Ruth is made from a piece of Huon Pine. With some difficulty Ruth found a photo of Mike in profile which was used as the design for the plaque. The design was burnt onto the wood and placed by Wilmar in a rustic setting.

Ruth, daughter Della and Rotary friends contributed to a delicious afternoon tea in Wilmar's barn. It was a wonderful way to celebrate Mike's achievements in the daffodil world as it drew together friends from many different areas in Mike's very full life. The garden will be indeed a glorious display in years to come when fully mature. Thank you, Ruth and Wilmar for this remarkable garden and the opportunity to visit it.

'How to Improve Hydrophobic Soil'




Most gardeners are aware that organic fertilisers stimulate soil microbes, however you may not realise that when you use an organic fertiliser, it actually helps soil to overcome water repellence issues, and the

The inability of soils to take up water is really down to the waxy coating on soil particles. For sandy soils, only about 2-4% of the particles need to be coated for water to be repelled, and for clay soil it's about 10%.

THE BUZZY BUSTER

Acaena novae-zelandiae or common old buzzy is a small herbaceous perennial which is stoloniferous with prostrate stems. The leaves are toothed and shiny and any damage to the stolons encourages new shoots. It occurs in a wide range of habitat but typically in areas that received a high amount of sun and establishes itself readily on disturbed sites. I have read where this plant can be used as a ground cover or lawn substitute but I think you would have to be pretty desperate. Maybe I'm wrong.

The flowers which are little balls lack petals and range in colour from green, white or purple and are produced on scapes about 10cm long and are wind pollinated. The flower as it matures forms a ball with spines tipped with barbs which aid in dispersal. Especially on socks, trousers and dogs.

Recently we have had lots of buzzies growing along our fence line and before dealing with the plant we needed to get rid of the seed heads. The solution was so simple and effective. Just tie some old socks or cut up woolen jumper to the end of a pole and lightly drag over the plant, within seconds the plant is buzzy free and you can dispose of the seed by burning or in the garbage.
