Our 4 shows continue to be an attraction for the public with well in excess of 2000 patrons attending overall. "The LHS presents the best horticultural displays in Tasmania", is a comment I frequently hear. This, I am sure, is something of which we can all be proud.

To reflect the various seasons each show has had its unique features:

**AUTUMN** The floor presentation of produce together with floral chairs created

an amazing celebration of Autumn and Harvest time.

Judge Les Hodge's comment that it was the best display of produce he

had ever judged.

The new begonia floret display boxes which added amazing colour to

the hall.

**EARLY SPRING** The challenge of the hall's dilapidated state resulted in an innovated

layout.

The introduction of the Cactus and Succulent section was a resounding

success.

**LATE SPRING** The smallest of our shows. A very pretty show and as one member

commented: "A terrific show".

**SUMMER** A hall bursting with exhibits was a fitting show for the Governor to

open. This is now becoming our biggest show of the year.

We have been most fortunate to have the team of Bob Cherry, Neil and Irene Jordan and Shane O'Connell supporting each of these shows. Their stage displays featuring high quality blooms reflect the expertise of these growers.

Sarah Katarzynski, our Show Secretary, must be thanked for her continued hard work and organisational skills, acquired over many years.

In addition, I want to thank all members who have contributed to the many and varied tasks in running our shows, as success depends on a team effort.

On average, we have achieved a 50 plus attendance at meetings with many new and regular presenters extending our horticultural knowledge. The raffle, competitions and trade table continue to be well supported. The Launceston City Council has willingly provided a new whiteboard and secure cupboard in the kitchen. I thank all members who help with the smooth running of these meetings.

At last, our website is up and running. This, in conjunction with our Facebook page will allow for better communication with the wider community. Again, I must thank Kai Johnston and Dr Trish Corrie for the many hours they invested in making this a reality. In addition, I owe Abby Gray, Vicki McCormack and Michael Webster a debt of gratitude for their Facebook contributions.

This year, 3 members have been recognised by GCA for their contributions to our society:

Gayle Carroll – service to Floral Art Norma Purton – general service over many years Ray Hawkins – general service over many years

In addition, Charlie Smith was recognised for his extensive work as an exhibitor, breeder and promoter of dahlias.

This year, the Bulb and Alpine group has unfortunately experienced a decline and may be forced into recess if a co-ordinator cannot be found.

The Floral Art workshops have been well attended and bench exhibits well supported. As many of you are aware, Floral Art continues to be a major part of our shows. A thank you to Gail Carrol and her team.

The Cactus and Succulent group continues to grow in popularity with up to 28 members attending each meeting. Just giving you the heads up: It is now a bring your own chair situation!

This trend has resulted in over 100 entries in this section in each of the last three shows. Again, Pam Bennell and her team are to be thanked for their efforts.

Financially, the society has completed another year on favourable terms with each show on average returning an income of \$4000, allowing us to invest in show infrastructure and subsidised excursions. Special thanks must go to our treasurer, Marilyn Fraterman.

I must also thank Patricia Beams, our landscape editor, for all her hard work this year.

As you well know, health and safety challenges have forced us to seek an alternative show venue. We have been very fortunate to find the Evandale Memorial Hall which more than meets our requirements and will no doubt allow us to implement new ideas into the future.

The passing of Ray Hawkins, a life member of our society, has been a great loss felt by many members. Ray made a huge contribution to the LHS over five plus decades. In honour of Ray, we anticipate creating a special award in the Camellia section of our show together with a memorial plant in City Park. The latter has posed a challenge due to the parks Heritage Classification.

Talking about City Park - Norma Purton, Liz Atkins and Tony Dennett have continued to maintain the Dahlia Beds. These beds create an enormous amount of interest with visitors and continue the LHS' continued historical association with City Park.

Finally, I must thank the committee for their collegial and continued hard work in achieving the goals of our society.

The risks taken moving to Evandale were more than rewarded. Attendance doubled to approximately one thousand happy people attending. Numerous positive comments and "wow" statements about the quality of the exhibition and outside plant stalls made all the hard work more than worthwhile. If promotion of horticulture is one of our goals, we certainly achieved it here.

General meetings continue to attract many members and play a crucial part in enhancing our interests in horticulture.

Late last year a substantial donation was made to the LHS when the Tasmanian Daffodil Council was dissolved.

Charlie and Lucy Smith were made Honourary Members of the LHS for their contributions over five decades. In addition, Charlie was awarded the President's Award by Garden Clubs of Australia for his outstanding contribution by an individual to gardening and/or horticulture.

For her contributions to the LHS over many years, Rosie McCullagh has been awarded a Life Membership. Rosie has been a Committee Member, a keen member of the Floral Art Group and a supporter of our shows as a steward and exhibitor.

In February, forty members and friends travelled to Hobart to visit the beautiful Government House gardens, an amazing Otago Bay garden and Runnymede.
