VALLEYFIELD & HOBART

Bus Trip – 30 October 2021

The Society's most recent outing was to Valleyfield at New Norfolk, the Lachlan Flower Show and a private garden at Moonah. Fortunately the weather was sunny, in contrast to the previous day which had been very wet. The countryside was very green. We picked up members of the Longford Garden Club at Perth and a club member at Oatlands and we had morning tea beside Lake Dulverton at Oatlands.

Valleyfield is located on the banks of the Derwent River. The garden was open and the Derwent Valley Garden Club hosted a fair with a wide range of plant and food stalls and some live music. These were in and around the beautiful agricultural buildings. Valleyfield is the home of the former Governor of Tasmania, Kate Warner, and her husband Richard. Some of our group met them wandering in the garden and had their photo taken with them. White settlers came to Valleyfield in 1813, and the Warner family have owned the property since 1919. The main house was commenced in 1822. There are a number of large established trees planted in the 1880's, including Himalayan Cedar and Canadian Redwood. There are terraced gardens and roses planted on arches, inspired by Monet's garden. There is a birthday garden created by the Warners to celebrate Kate's 50th birthday. The gardens led right down to the river.

We next visited the Lachlan Community Hall Flower Show. This was a small show but had an excellent range of entries. It was their very first flower show. They had a plant stall and some had a cup of tea.

The final visit was to Susan McKinnon's garden at Moonah. Proceeds from this visit went to BCCAfrica which is a charity established to support the children of the Bethlehem Community Centre in Kenya. Susan is a garden designer and with her husband Cameron has created an incredible garden. The front is a work in progress, but the back is a beautiful perennial garden. It is built on sloping block and connects well with the house via a lovely covered patio. The paths are well paved, the garden beds are curved, there is a dome shaped covered chicken house, a studio/office for Susan and a comfy outdoor fireplace. There was a photo album on display tracing the development of the garden. This style of garden really appeals to me. There was an impressive Chilean rhubarb which has massive leaves. It is described online as being a "horticultural beast" which can have leaves up to two meters across. It has become invasive in some places such as New Zealand and is difficult to eradicate. There are images of the garden on-line. The trip was most enjoyable. Thanks to Liz for organising it and to Franklin's coaches.

ARBORETUM, KAYDALE LODGE & BOB & DERELIE CHERRY

North West Bus Trip – 9 December 2021

Liz Atkins organised another day of inspiring garden visits, complete with “Covid check-ins”. The added bonus of meeting the garden gurus themselves, who guided us around each of the venues, added another dimension to those wonderlands of horticultural delights.



The Tasmanian Arboretum at Euganana was our first garden to explore with Judy, a guide from the Arboretum. The peaceful enchanting park takes in 66 hectares and was established in 1984 by locals and since been supported by volunteers and the Devonport City Council. Here there are collections of temperate woody plants from around the world, including Southern Hemisphere conifers and deciduous trees, with over 4,500 specimens. Of special note is a grove of the ancient and critically endangered Wollemi Pine, a coniferous tree which grows in temperate rain forests.

We saw the elusive platypus in Flounders Lake but when the bus stopped and we got out to observe, he was gone. There is also significant limestone heritage and remnants from the colonial mining days, including railway tracks which has given walking access to a natural gorge along the Don River. A return in the Autumn to experience the vibrant deciduous colours is a must.

We arrived at Kaydale Lodge just in time for lunch, some choosing to picnic in the vibrant gardens, whilst the majority enjoyed the home made delights of Kaydale Lodge.

Two generations of dedicated gardeners have created this amazing cool climate country garden, established in 1979 by Kay and Robert Crowden. Now daughters Amarlie and Lesley are continuing the family obsession

in using stone from the farm and cool climate plants.

Amarlie guided and entertained us with her enthusiastic tales of the family’s combined creative pursuits in the development of this family garden. Highlights of the garden tour included *The Pear Walk*, with 27 espaliered Beurre Bosc pear trees planted in 1994 by Robert and grafted together by Amarlie. That is more than 150 grafts!! But, maintenance of the trees is now much easier.

There were frogs croaking as we wondered through the *Woodland Garden* and beside the rockery a lone daffodil happily bloomed in December.

The *Kitchen Garden* now boasts a stoned *Summer House* (thanks to Covid) with a spiral staircase to the roof top view over the property, with views of Mt Roland a significant land mark. Our Summer visit coincided with the blooming of *Peony Hill* with its voluptuous flower display together with Poppies and Pulsatillas. Amarlie advised picking the Peonies when the buds “feel like marshmallows”. We were each generously gifted a Peony posy at the end of our tour.



Last but certainly not least, our day wrapped up at the long awaited visit to Bob and Derelie Cherry's Gawler property on the Gawler River.

Bob is a renowned international plant breeder nurseryman and I've heard an obsessive gardener. Derelie is an author and cut flower grower. Bob & Derelie moved to Tasmania from NSW six years ago and chose this property as it had “good bones and mature trees”, Bob's words, and offered the space for Bob to continue his plant breeding projects. The North

West coast offered rich volcanic soils, cool Winters, mild Summers and year round rainfall.

The garden beds were overflowing with colour and fragrance. Pretty pink roses and carnations, stately rows of brilliant blue delphiniums and purple globe artichokes. Delightful stone retaining walls with “wallflowers” made out of “a central rock with stone petals” all built by Bob. Initially Derelie was not keen on moving to Tasmania, but now they both love the new relaxed way of life.

I think the highlight of the bus trip (amongst many) was the opportunity to purchase reasonably priced plants, hanging baskets and pretty flower bouquets from Derelie's French inspired garden shop.

The bus groaned back to Launceston under the weight of all the plants purchased by the LHS. Thank you Liz Atkins.

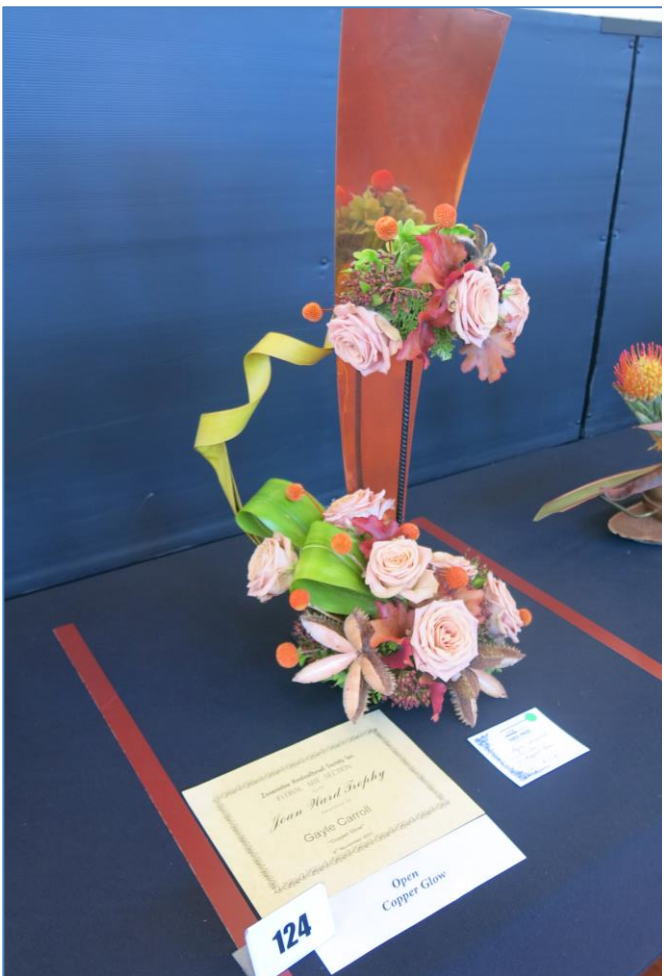
